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2009 Critical Care Nutrition Guidelines

The Clinical Practice Guidelines are a set of 209 randomized controlled trials in the area of critical care nutrition. All the guideline topics have undergone a formal review process and were last updated in January 2009 and May 2009 (as indicated in red). The 2009 update added 40 new randomized controlled trials to the evidence-based guidelines.

Canadian Clinical Practice Guidelines for Nutrition Support in Mechanically Ventilated, Critically ill Patients Care Nutrition. The Canadian Critical Care Practice Guidelines (CCPGs) were first published in 2003 and are among the most regularly updated evidence-based guidelines, with updates in 2005, 2007, 2009 and 2013. The 2013 CCPGs summarize the evidence from approximately 300 randomized controlled trials in the area of critical care nutrition since 1980.

CCCTG - Guidelines

GUIDELINES ON NUTRITIONAL SUPPORT IN ICU

Guidelines for the Provision and Assessment of Nutrition Support Therapy in the Adult Critically Ill Patient, from A.S.P.E.N. and the Society of Critical Care Medicine, are based on general conclusions of health professionals who, in developing such guidelines, have balanced potential benefits to be derived from a particular mode of medical therapy against certain risks inherent with such therapy.

A summary for Adult Critically Ill Patients

For patients with a BMI <30, protein requirements should be in the range of 1.2-2.0 gm/kg actual body weight. For patients with a BMI >30, protein requirements should be in the range of 1.2-2.0 gm/kg/day of adjusted body weight. b.

Both the 2009 and 2016 guidelines for critically ill patients state that screening for nutrition risk should be completed on every ICU patient, but the concept of addressing both nutrition status and disease severity is a new recommendation based on expert opinion that's included in the update.

ESPEN guidelines for nutrition in critical illness have shifted from optimistic anticipative nutritional pharmacotherapy towards cautious and balanced metabolic support. This important new orientation in ICU nutrition management is a consequence of recent strong RCT-based evidence.

New ESPEN Guidelines for Nutrition in the Critically Ill ...

The Canadian Critical Care Practice Guidelines (CCPGs) were first published in 2003 and most recently updated in 2013. A total of 68 new randomized controlled trials were identified since the last version in 2009, 50 of them published between 2009 and 2013.
